

Psychoanalytic theory posits that substance abuse, eating disorders and other addictive behaviors are ways of coping with intensely distressing states of body and mind. The person is searching for a way to protect and “restore the self,” or to be immune to narcissistic injury, abandonment, rage and, in some cases, the terror of “coming apart.”

This 30-week course begins with a review of **classical, object relations and intersubjective psychoanalytic concepts** pertaining to substance abuse and eating disorders.

We examine the **neurobiology of addiction, affect dysregulation and anxious attachment strategies** underlying compulsive food and substance use. We examine **sexual addiction, gambling, gaming and the allure of high-risk activities**. We look at how psychoanalytic psychotherapy helps us become more sensitively aware of the **culturally informed** meanings some diverse communities may attribute to food and substance use, stress, trauma and dysregulation.

Students will explore the slippery slope of **enactments** and how for some, a **psychotic character** may underlie a client’s eating or substance use problem. Finally, we uncover the powerful and covert dialogue between **personality disorders, food and substance use**.

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GOALS and OBJECTIVES

- Describe the psychoanalytic theories pertaining to addictive states of body and mind.
- Decode unconscious motivations in the use and maintenance of addictions and eating disorders.
- Identify the brain structures and early developmental traumas that underlie the patient's affect dysregulation and struggle to cope with stress.
- Attend to primitive psychic structures, defenses and potential for enactments within the work.
- Apply psychoanalytic concepts and interventions to work with patients struggling with compulsive behaviors and process addictions.

REQUIREMENTS

- A minimum of a B.A. is required.



